Lake Norman was created in 1963 by Duke Energy (formerly Duke Power Company) and is named after former Duke Power President Norman Cocks. The lake serves the area in many ways, including flood control, electricity, water, waterfowl preservation, and by providing a terrific source of recreation. Duke Energy has three power plants on Lake Norman: Cowans Ford Hydroelectric Station, Marshall Steam Plant, and McGuire Nuclear Station. Driving Laws:

The citywide speed limit is 35mph unless otherwise posted. The school zone and residential speed limit is 25mph. Drivers are forbidden to drink alcohol or have an open container of an alcoholic beverage in the passenger area. Motorcyclists are required to wear helmets and lights must be on at all times. Children eight and younger and under 80 pounds must be properly secured in a weight appropriate child restraint system. Seat belts are mandatory for drivers and all passengers in the vehicle.

Bethesda School House (Exit 25)

Relocated to the Historic Rural Hill Farm, the Bethesda Schoolhouse is a rural primary school for African Americans in Mecklenburg County and is significant as a rare surviving artifact of the early efforts by the county's black residents to educate their children, a newly won privilege after the Civil War. The schoolhouse is the oldest identified African American primary school in Mecklenburg County, and is significant as one of the county's few surviving rural schoolhouses. The schoolhouse is one of the earliest surviving non-residential African American buildings in the county, and is therefore important in understanding the broad patterns county's history.

Davidson College (Exit 30)

Davidson College was founded in 1837 by ministers of the Concord Presbytery. Its 1,700 students come from almost every state in the nation and many foreign countries. With a highly selective admissions process and NCAA Division I athletics, Davidson College is a diverse, historical and prestigious campus. Davidson College is over 170 years old, so there are many buildings and features of the campus that date back to its early days and provide a great history of the school. One of the oldest buildings in the town, Carolina Inn, has been a part of the campus since 1946. The "Old Quad" is perhaps the most historic part of the campus, containing four of the oldest buildings. The historic Oak Row and Elm Row, built in 1836-37, were the original dormitories of Davidson. Eumenean ("Eu") and Philanthropic ("Phi") Halls were built in 1850 and named for secret societies that met there. The new Chambers building was built in 1929 in the same spot as the old Chambers building, which burnt down in 1921. With continuing renovations and numerous historical buildings, the Davidson campus is a great mix of a charming past and a promising future.

Davidson College Sculpture Garden (Exit 30)

The Campus Sculpture Program was born out of several donors' desire to acquire acclaimed outdoor sculptures for Davidson's campus. The campus sculpture program has historic roots that date back to 1954 when Doug Houchens and the Fine Arts Committee sought funding to bring permanent works of art for the campus. Although their request did not succeed fifty years ago, alumni and supporters of Davidson College approved a similar initiative in 2006. Dedicated in 2007, the garden now features three sculptures by artists -- William Tucker's *Homage to Rodin* (1999), Antony Gormley's *You* (2005), and *Untitled* (1995) by Joel Shapiro.

Davidson College Arboretum (Exit 30)

In the late 1850's, some students at Davidson College proposed a landscape remodeling plan to the Board of Trustees. When the plan was not successful, the students decided to plant trees themselves all over campus. Since that time, the grounds of the campus have become home to many different types of plants, flowers and trees. It is even rumored that former United States president, Woodrow Wilson planted a tree during his year at the college. In 1982, Davidson officially became a nationally registered arboretum and there are now over 3,000 labeled trees and other plants.
